

9-8-8 Implementation Planning



• What is 9-8-8?

A national, easy-to-remember 3-digit line for individuals in mental health and suicide crisis to be connected to trained counselors.

When you've got a police, fire or rescue emergency, you call 911. When you have an urgent mental health need, you'll call 988.

- Federal legislation mandating the rollout of the 9-8-8 number by July 2022
- With a planning grant from Vibrant, DSAMH is working closely with DSCYF and other agencies, Delaware's Lifeline Center (ContactLifeline), and the DE Suicide Prevention Coalition to form the 9-8-8 Planning Coalition.

Police Diversion Program



PRE-ARREST DIVERSION AND NAVIGATION AND SUPPORT THROUGHOUT TREATMENT

Goal of the Program:

Divert individuals who are struggling with Substance Use Disorder and/or Mental Health challenges AWAY from the Criminal Justice and INTO Treatment and Services.

What:

Delaware State Police Troops 2, 3, 7 (Representing New Castle, Kent and Sussex Counties) embedded a DSAMH Care Manager and a Peer Support Specialist.

How:

DSP Troopers provide a warm-hand-off to the DSAMH Care Manager and Peer Support Specialist to assess and then help navigate the individual's treatment and recovery.

LEVERAGING SOR TO ADDRESS THE OPIOID AND STIMULANT CRISES

- An opportunity to reverse overdose trends
 - There were 431 overdose deaths in Delaware in 2019; 80% involved synthetic opioids
- An opportunity to strengthen post-overdose engagement and treatment retention
 - 40% of Delawareans who died of overdoses had at least one non-fatal overdose
- An opportunity to address stimulant use which is on the rise
 - Non-fatal and fatal overdoses associated with psychostimulants are increasing in Delaware and surrounding states
- An opportunity to address social needs
 - 40% of Delawareans who died of overdoses were unhoused or had unstable housing

SOR 2.0 GRANT FY 2021-22 GOALS



Build infrastructure to oversee and implement grant activities	Develop a framework to engage the Opioid Response Provider Network (OPRN) in providing effective and accountable treatment services	Promote universal screening for OUD/STUD	Decrease opioid overdoses statewide through low threshold access to naloxone, medication for OUD (MOUD) and addiction treatment services
Expand OUD/STUD treatment engagement strategies and reduce barriers to accessing services	Promote evidence-based referral and linkage to treatment	Improve treatment retention strategies for individuals and special populations with OUD/STUD	Collect high quality data to track program performance and reach
