






Sequential Intercept Model

- People move through the criminal justice system in predictable ways.
- Illustrates key points, or intercepts, to ensure:
 - Prompt access to treatment.
 - Opportunities for diversion.
 - Timely movement through the criminal justice system.
 - Engagement with community resources.






Intercept 0-1 (Community Services, Crisis and Law Enforcement)






